EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF OKLAHOMA
Report of the Standing Committee
to the 79th Convention of the Diocese

In the Diocese of Oklahoma, members of the Standing Committee also serve on Diocesan Council and meet regularly as part of that body. The bishop does occasionally convene the Standing Committee separately in our capacity as his confidential Council of Advice. Many other canonical functions of the Standing Committee only are relevant when the diocese is without a diocesan bishop to serve as the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Since the 78th Convention of the Diocese on October 30-31, 2015, in addition to actions taken in our role as an integral part of Diocesan Council, the Standing Committee took the following official actions:

- 1) We gave canonical consent to hold an election for a Bishop Co-Adjutor in the Diocese of Los Angeles and a Bishop Suffragan in the Diocese of West Texas.
- 2) We gave canonical consent for the consecrations of duly elected bishops in the following dioceses: Dallas (George Sumner), Eastern Oregon (Patrick William Bell), Easton (Santosh K. Marray), Pennsylvania (Daniel Gutierrez), Northern Indiana (Douglas E Sparks), Western North Carolina (José McLoughlin), Central New York (Dede Duncan-Probe).
- 3) We approved the admission of ten persons to candidacy for holy orders: Justin Boyd, Dion Crider, José (Cuco) Escalera, Keith Fallis, Rocio Lopez, Caleb Roberts, Andrew Scott, Robert Scott, Shawna Turner, and James Tyree.
- 4) We consented to the ordinations of four persons to the sacred order of priests (Bryan Beard, Larry Rogers, Lin Stern, and David Thompson).

Report of the Constitution and Canons Committee – 2016

Synopsis of Proposed Amendment to the Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Oklahoma

The Constitution and Canons Committee (“*We*”) regularly proposes amendments to the Diocesan Canons to maintain their currency and effectiveness.

Proposed Amendment. For the 79th Diocesan Convention, we are proposing an amendment to require the Bishop’s prior consent to the appointment of a headmaster, president or other chief executive officer of a Diocesan institution. This express statement confirms what was understood in practice. Institutions have traditionally obtained the Bishop’s consent before the appointment. Canon 7.20 of the Diocesan Canons is marked to show the proposed amendment.

Model Parish Bylaws. The Committee maintains a model form for parish bylaws, which is available for download on the Diocesan website (www.epiok.org). The model form is intended to encourage congregations to maintain current bylaws and to facilitate compliance with the Diocesan Canons, Church Canons and other applicable law. The model form is not intended to prescribe uniformity. The annotations indicate when a provision is mandatory due to canonical or legal requirements. Other provisions can be altered to conform to parish practices. Bracketed language appears throughout the model form suggesting choices that a congregation might make. The annotations should be removed in a congregation’s adopted bylaws. Under Oklahoma law, the vestry (or a mission’s bishop’s committee) adopts the bylaws by a majority vote.

The Committee encourages input about the Diocesan Canons and its work.

2016 Convention Report on Oklahoma Council on Indian Ministry

On September 10th, The Oklahoma Council on Indian Ministry (OCIM) hosted the 30th Annual David Pendleton Oakerhater Honor Dance to honor the 50 years of ministry to Native Americans. The celebration and powwow was held at the Whirlwind Mission of the Holy Trinity in Watonga, Oklahoma. The highlight of the day was the presence of the Most Reverend Michael Curry, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. Bishop Curry's sermon was a powerful message pointing to following Jesus as "the Way" and calling everyone to serve as well as to love. Bishop Curry spoke to the commitment of David Pendleton Oakerhater, calling him "an apostle for our time" serving faithfully often against all odds, despite hard times and even when he had to do it with little help from The Episcopal Church. The event was also attended by members of the Bishop's Native Collaborative including The Rt. Reverend Michael Smith, Bishop of North Dakota, The Rt. Reverend Carol Gallagher, Bishop for Native American Ministries & Assistant Bishop of Montana, The Reverend Canon Cornelia Eaton of Navajoland, and The Reverend Canon Robert Two Bulls of Minnesota. After a Holy Eucharist and dinner serving the 300 attendees, the evening culminated with a powwow celebrating Oakerhater's life and honoring Mr. Malcolm Whitebird as Honored Elder. Several members of Oakerhater's family led the grand opening.

In late January of 2017, OCIM will serve as host for a meeting of Native American delegates at Saint Crispin's. This meeting will be a call to strengthen the bonds between all Native American Nations and to discuss the direction of ministry to Native Americans. Presiding Bishop Curry has indicated he possibly will attend. Currently a search for the Episcopal Church Indigenous Missioner is in process and hopefully this person will be selected in time to attend the January meeting.

A search still is in process to appoint an Oklahoma Native Missioner. With thirty nine federally recognized tribes in Oklahoma there is need for Episcopalian ministry to reach members of all parishes and will be a

focus for OCIM in this coming year. Deacons Pat Gonzales, Cynthia Gilks, and Bobby Saunkeah continue to serve. Each year OCIM through The Cherokee Scholarship Committee offers scholarship support for enrolled female members of the Cherokee Nation. OUR MISSION:

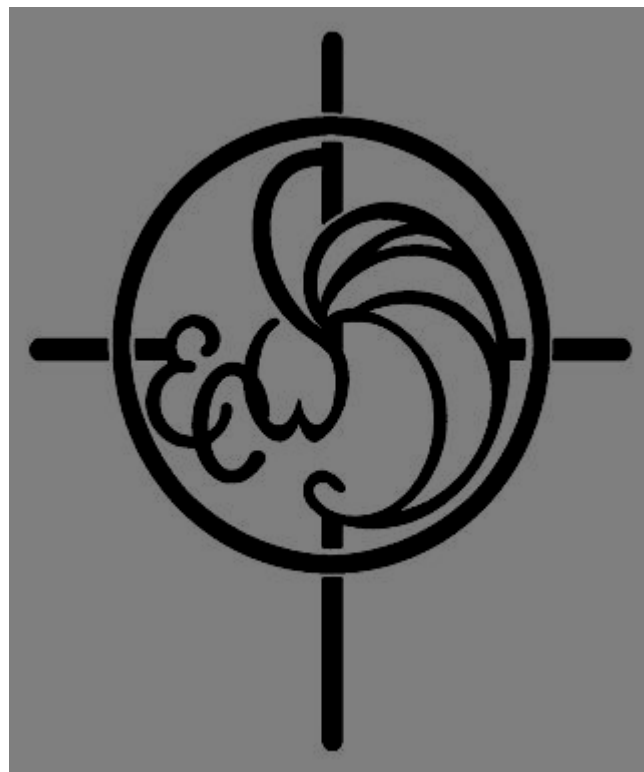
We are Sisters in Christ. We are every Episcopal Woman lay or ordained. We are committed to prayer, listening, leadership, study, service, giving and fellowship.

The Episcopal Church Women's organization is made up of all women of the church. While individual churches may not have a formal organized group called ECW, this does not preclude the women in that church from membership in this state-wide organization. The Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Oklahoma offers programs throughout the year for the women of this diocese and their guests.

Examples of the programs offered to the women in our diocese include our Women's retreats – held twice a year at St. Crispin's Camp and Conference Center. In addition to our retreats, programs are often presented in each of the regions of the diocese. Our Annual Conference & Bishop's Day brings women together from around Oklahoma for prayer, education and fellowship. In years just prior to the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, the women elect delegates to represent our state at the Triennial of the Episcopal Church Women which meets concurrently with General Convention. The next Triennial will be held in 2018 in Austin, Texas.

Retreats held in the Spring and Fall at St. Crispin's are well attended by Episcopal Women. They have also served as an excellent opportunity for outreach as attendees often recruit women from outside the Episcopal Church to join them for spiritual renewal and study offered at these events. The Reverend Debora Jennings continues to instruct and entertain with topics and activities very popular with our members and guests. The 2017 dates for the Women's retreats are February 24-25 and October 6-8.

Episcopal Women support many ministries within the state and across the nation. Each year we publish the "Blue Book", our directory which is distributed to all clergy, churches and diocesan leaders, organized ECWs, key women, and churches. In addition, women of the church support the greater community including New Hope, Whirlwind Mission, United Thank Offering, Church Periodical Club, Cursillo, The Bishop's Cup, Summer Camp and others. This past year at our Annual Conference & Bishop's Day in Oklahoma City, the ECW presented \$500.00 to the Bishop's Cup for funds to help with the purchase of new furniture for summer camp. The alms collected at the Annual Conference and Bishop's Day was given to the children of the Whirlwind Mission in Watonga, Oklahoma to help them attend summer camp. Members of the ECW board traveled to St. Crispin's to treat camp staff to luncheon at the conclusion of one of the camp sessions. In September, women from several congregations helped with the Oakerhater Celebration and Honor Dance to serve an outstanding traditional meal and welcome our

St. Paul's Cathedral, Oklahoma City, hosted our Annual Conference & Bishop's Day this past April. The theme of the conference was "Bring Us Your Talent. Serve One Another With Whatever Gift You Have Received". The keynote speaker was Dr. Lisa Wolfe who is a Professor of the Endowed Chair of Hebrew Bible at Oklahoma City. Dr. Wolfe delighted the conference attendees with stories of not so well known bible women and the grace they found in spite of their circumstances. Participants enjoyed a time of fellowship making prayer candles, learning about Ignatian Spirituality and the practice of discernment, and visiting several of Oklahoma City's historical areas. The conference was well attended and we received very favorable evaluations. The women of St. Paul's were fabulous hosts and gave us a wonderful time of teaching and renewal. Worship and Eucharist was led by Bishop Ed, and Dean Justin Lindstrom.

ECW has a Facebook page that is open to all Episcopal Church Women. We encourage everyone to check the page out and invite the women of your church to "join" the page. Christina Thurber is our webmaster. She's always looking for upcoming events from your parish to post on the ECW website. Contact her to let the rest of the diocese know what the women are doing in your church. To check out up-coming events for Oklahoma's Episcopal Church Women, simply access our website through the diocesan website. We use the weekly electronic newsletter from our diocese for notice of upcoming events too. Keep track of the movers and shakers in the ECW for this year with our notices that come to your email from the diocese.

In April of 2017, Christ Church in Tulsa will host our Annual Conference & Bishop's Day. Father Lees and the women of Christ Church are planning a great program and activities for all who will attend. More information will be arriving soon, mark your calendars now to be in Tulsa on April 28-29 for a grand time with the ECW of Oklahoma.

- On October 23rd, we hosted the 3rd annual St. Crispin's Day Massacre Mountain Bike Race. This race was a part of the Tour de Dirt State Mountain Bike

Championship series and provided great exposure for our facility and trails by bringing in riders from across Oklahoma and neighboring states.

- St. Crispin's hosted the Oklahoma State Fat Bike Championship race on October 29th, 2016.
- St. Crispin's hosted the Oklahoma Cyclocross State Championship on Sunday, October 30th, 2016.
- By the end of 2016, St. Crispin's will have hosted over 130 retreat and camping groups.
- The building project is nearing completion and we anticipate the new Summer Camp buildings to be open by the end of 2016.

Christian Formation – Annual Report - 2016

It just seemed like yesterday that I was doing my 2014-15 report and now another year has come and gone.

Diocesan Convention last year, we had a “Round-Up Rodeo” theme, which was held at Trinity, Tulsa. Leadership for this event was directed by Katie Gallion and a team of willing adults and youth ministers from around the Diocese. The group was served BBQ compliments of the Brotherhood at Trinity, and then had a good hour of line dancing and the mechanical bull saw its share of bronco busting!

On Saturday, the group lead worship for convention along with their talents for music and singing.

We recognized the graduates from the 2nd Episcopal Youth Leadership Program (EYLA) Steve Bilsbury, Zeke Brown, Kiri Holder, Emma Kane, Lauren, Kane, Susanna LeMasters, Covell Lindstrom, Bryna Madden, Lauren Paque, and Rachel Webb.

Safeguarding God’s Children – This continues to be a priority for the diocese, with over 2,500 individuals having completed the course.

Safeguarding God’s People – As of now, we have 583 people trained in this program.

Cultural Awareness – This year, we held two training – one in OKC and one in Tulsa. We anticipate offering two more trainings next year in both locations

New Beginnings –Thanks to Christ Church, Tulsa, for serving as our hosting parish for New Beginnings. Thirteen participants were involved along with a large staff of some 20 other youth.

Happening –Our 2016 Happening will be at St. Anslem of Canterbury on the campus of OU. Philip Newcomer and Kelsey Brass have already had a staff planning meeting and brochures are out to the congregations.

Spirituality – The Diocese offered a weekend on using the Enneagram, which was led by The Rev. Clyde Glandon, and held at St. Paul’s Cathedral, OKC. We had a large number of participants from other faith traditions in attendance.

Godly Play Training – The Diocese has continued to support the training of adults for the Godly Play program. We offered two trainings this year – one at Grace, Yukon, and our first advanced training at Christ Church, Tulsa. Both of these trainings were well attended. Eucharist and Baptism in a Box – Last year for Convention, I offered Eucharist in a Box – a way to teach about Eucharist, provide resources, and have a hand’s on experience with the things that make up Eucharist. I am pleased that several congregations have had either Eucharist or Baptism offered for Sunday morning or Wednesday night offerings. Both of these offerings are still available and I would be glad to come to your congregation and do the program for you.

Mission Camp – March 13 - 16 and was based at St. Crispin's. Participants did work to the physical grounds, but groups also went to St. Marks, Seminole, and together with The Rev. Elizabeth Davis, provided cleaning, painting, sanding and other works to spruce up the facilities. Special thanks to The Rev. Tim Sean Youmans, Daniel Chapman, and Katie Gallion for coordinating this event.

We again supported two congregations in attending in **National Cathedral Acolyte Festival** in Washington, DC in October.

Summer Camp – What wonderful fun was had by all at Summer Camp this year. We only had 1 space that was not filled! We know we will exceed our numbers next year as we move into the new facilities.

Altered – Altered has a great pattern – a fall “Altered” event, presentations, worship, small group time – and a spring retreat. A special thanks for the skills of The Rev. Blake Woods and Laura Beth who have lead this group. We welcome Tyler and Angela Davis, along with The Revs. Tim and Kirsten Baer who will be overseeing this event for the future

Education for Ministry – We again hosted a training in August for those who are mentors, or those who would like to become mentors. The reputation for our space, trainings, and location has made us a good fit for those from Kansas, Missouri, Arizona, Texas, and Arkansas.

ChurchNext – We continue to support 6 congregations in using the ChurchNext materials as a part of their Christian Formation.

Mind, Body and Spirit – This event was held August 11th at St. Augustine's of Canterbury, OKC. Workshops included Praying in Color, The One Constant in Life as We Age is...Change, Developing an Individual Spiritual Discipline, Guest lunch speaker, Beth Patterson - Executive Director RSVP of Central Oklahoma, Chair Yoga, Planning for Your Death and HomeFit.

Bishop's Lecture Series – Our 3rd Lecture Series was held at St. Paul's Cathedral on September 11 and 12. Learning about personal accountability was the theme as we had discussions with and shared resources with Kristen Lindeen, daughter of John Miller, author of QBQ (Question behind the Question). Next year's speaker will be Diana Butler Bass.

Youth Leader's Retreat – We offered our 2nd Youth Leader's retreat July of this year at St. Crispin's. Sara Bailey from Ministry Architects was again our leader.

Liturgy Festival Training and Eucharist – This event was celebrated on October 15 at St. Paul's Cathedral, OKC. This year, we invited Roger Hutchinson, artist, author, and the Director of Christian Formation and Parish Life at Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church in Houston, Texas.

Commission on Ministry

Over the past year members of the Commission continued to work with Bishop Konieczny and Canon McLoughlin to coordinate our efforts to prepare people for ordained ministry. Various initiatives include:

- The **IONA School of Formation**, based at St. Crispin's. The IONA School has its roots in the Iona School for Ministry in the Diocese of Texas. At the IONA School of Formation, students gather for monthly weekends during the academic year for three years, preparing for ordination either to the diaconate or as bi-vocational priests. Dr. Steve Orwig is the Academic Dean of the IONA School of Formation.
- The **Discernment Program**, a nine-month program for aspirants (people who are considering the possibility of ordained ministry). Aspirants meet monthly to examine different aspects of the priesthood and the diaconate, in order to explore their call to ministry. Members of the Commission on Ministry often participate in these monthly sessions. The Rev. Joseph Alsay oversees the program, working with the Rev. Deacon Dana Orwig.
- The **BACM (Bishop's Advisory Council on Ministry) Weekend**, an event in April of each year in which the Commission and the Bishop meet with aspirants who have successfully completed the Discernment Program. The goal of the BACM Weekend is to gain clarity about the aspirants' perceived call to ordained ministry.

The Commission is discussing the possibility of new initiatives, including ways that the Commission can support, encourage, and keep in contact with seminarians while they are away from the Diocese.

There are currently 31 individuals in the Holy Orders process in the Diocese of Oklahoma:

- 7 Aspirants
- 7 Postulants/Candidates for the bi-vocational Priesthood
- 5 Postulants/Candidates for full-time Priesthood
- 12 Postulants/Candidates for the Diaconate

It is my privilege to work with the members of the Commission on Ministry: The Rev. Deacon John Belzer, Field Griffin, the Rev. Kristi Maulden, the Rev. Deacon Tony Moon, Dr. Steve Orwig, the Rev. Emily Schnabl, the Rev. Clark Shackelford, and the Rev. John Toles.

A Sample of the Formations Programs of Our Summer Camp Deans 2016

Theme: The Golden Thread: Sharing Our Sacred Story

ABC Camp (A Beginner's Camp) ABC connected the Golden Thread by talking about the 10 Best Ways (10 Commandments), then how Jesus took them to 2, and then commissioned our youngest, and their parents, to go out into the world and be Christ's hands and feet. We were blessed to have Debbie Konieczny write a story, The Thread of Gold, and a copy was given to each person to take home.

Intermediate Camp (Rising 4th, 5th and 6th Graders) On Monday we talked about the St. Crispin's Rule of Life with a craft writing down each rule on something they could take home. Tuesday we discussed how we all had struggles and how prayer can help us through the hard times, they learned prayer prompts and also made prayer rocks. Wednesday we talked about unconditional love and kindness. The kids made a paper chain of acts of kindness. Thursday we discussed fears and we can know God is always with us, this tied in with our walk through the labyrinth the kids left their fears (rocks that symbolized their fears) in the labyrinth that evening. Friday was friendship Friday we discussed friendships and relationships that began at St. Crispin's, even did a slideshow showing the campers some of the staff's relationships that all started at camp. On Saturday we tied all these together with pieces of gold material, each day was represented on a thread and they were all woven together to show how we all come together in this golden thread.

Junior High Camp. Junior High campers delved into the lives of the Saints to learn about them as Christ followers not unlike us at all, everyday people with an important and sacred story to tell. Each camper was given a booklet of twenty-five famous male and female saints and their stories and asked to choose a personal saint whom he or she identified with most. During the week we studied Saint Mary, Saint Stephen, Mother Teresa of Calcutta, and Saint John of the Cross. In family groups, we challenged the campers to see their own lives in the circumstances each Saint encountered. For Saints and for us, life gives us opportunities for service, humility, joy, and brokenness. Family groups chose a saint and performed a skit telling his or her life story. Lastly, each camper created a story bracelet throughout the week, adding a different color bead to represent Mary, Stephen, Theresa, and John. The last bead on the bracelet represented the saint the campers chose as their personal saint.

Senior High Camp. This summer for Sr. High focused on how each of us can be a Golden Thread in the world. On a high level, we discussed topics such as civil and Christian responsibilities, creation versus destruction, discrimination, relationships and support systems. Through each of those topics we concentrated on how each of us can be Golden Threads in every situation we encounter. We started our week with giving each person a golden thread to wear on their wrist as a reminder of our call to be Golden Threads, & how it can symbolize life through Christ and each other. One of the most impactful moments of the week was when we had a prayer vigil for the Orlando victims.

All Ages Week (Rising 4th thru Senior High). Human beings are tribal and cultural creatures, God told Abraham and Sarah that thru their descendants, all the nations of the earth would be blessed. We looked at the good side of our need to be in groups, and the potential downsides. The Senior High Group was "banished" for a couple of days for being "too different" while they went on a camping trip, but were eventually welcomed home with teaching to the younger ages about the practice of diversity within unity.

Entering its 50th year, Summer Camp continues to provide impactful, meaningful, long-lasting, formational experiences. The impact of our summer camping ministry ripples through the lives of campers, staff, and the Diocese.

Summer Camp is a collaborative ministry of the Diocese. Given prominent roles in the planning and execution of the program are the Summer Staff. These college-age young adults are the frontlines of the ministry—living in the cabins, engaging the campers, facilitating discussion groups, encouraging growth, planning and implementing the daily schedules. This ministry belongs to them. It is in their relationships with each other and with the campers where the true fruits of St. Crispin's are grown.

Our 15 Summer Staff was top notch this summer and continuously blew me away with their creativity and drive, as well as their care for the campers' experience. The 2016 Summer Staff were: Mitchel Bibelheimer, Emma Brown, Miranda Eaton, Luke Gronemeyer, Sydney Hinds, Beth Holingsworth, Blair Johnson, Adam Lawhorn, Savannah Lyne, Connor Newman, Brandon Purvis, Molly Routon, Kevin Rysted, Jade Simpkin, and Joe Virely.

For this first time this year we hired 3 staff from England! It was an amazing experience for all involved. Their excitement to experience the U.S. was met by our excitement to learn about England...okay, more specifically to hear them say different words in their accents! Connor, Jade, and Joe were invaluable additions to the staff. This place has become theirs and I think it safe to say the experience will stay with them for a lifetime—it certainly will for us.

Alongside the Summer Staff, the weekly Dean Team (groups of lay and ordained adults from throughout the Diocese) is primarily responsible for the daily religious teachings for the Camp, called the “Ah Ha!” We are ever grateful for those who give of their time and talents to contribute in this way to Summer Camp.

Finding medical volunteers to cover the sessions proved challenging this summer, but we made it work. The folks that came out this summer were absolutely amazing. The willingness of some to help us out in a pinch was above and beyond amazing. This year we will be investigating ways to get the word out and increase our medical volunteer pool.

The Counselor in Training (CIT) program gives older campers the chance to peek behind-the-scenes, to see what it’s really like to be a counselor, in the hopes that someday they will be up to the challenge. This summer saw 23 CITs.

A first this summer was the All Ages session—a great success! Campers from 4th grade through high school were all present at one session. Being the first time we’ve offered this, the staff took the opportunity to try new things and ran with it. Their overall goal was creating a large, tight-knit community between the age groups. Having younger and older campers was a new type of experience for everyone, and we learned that Camp is Camp even when we do different things.

Some people may not be aware that on Saturdays after the conclusion of each session, the week’s staff shares a final meal. The meals are prepared by various groups and individuals as a way of directly supporting and being a part of the summer ministry. The staff works tirelessly during sessions. Camp food is pretty good, but a delicious meal made by a group goes a long way to boost spirits! Thank you to those who cooked for us this summer: Aaron Mooney, St. Mark’s in Seminole, the ECW, and the St. Crispin’s BBQ crew.

OKLAHOMA DAUGHTERS OF THE KING 2016

The Order of the Daughters of the King began on Easter Eve, April 4, 1885, at the Episcopal Church of the Holy Sepulcher, now known as the Church of the Resurrection in New York City. The Order was founded by Margaret J. Franklin as the outgrowth of a Bible class and named Daughters of the King. Within seven years, fifty chapters had formed and the National Order of the Daughters of the King was established. By the following year, 1893, the Order's membership had grown to 8,000 and the first national convention of the Daughters of the King was held. Since that time, chapters have spread throughout the world. Today there are chapters located throughout the United States, the Caribbean, South America, Europe, Africa and India.

In the Diocese of Oklahoma, there are seventeen active senior chapters at present, located in Duncan, Durant, El Reno, Guthrie, Midwest City, Muskogee, Ponca City, Norman (two chapters), Oklahoma City (three chapters), and Tulsa (three chapters), as well as one junior chapter at St. John's Church, Norman. Chapter membership has been gradually increasing this year. There are also 23 Daughters-At-Large, who do not live in areas where an active chapter is located. Individual chapters decide their own meeting schedules to suit their group. They also select their own meeting style, book studies, projects, and the frequency of their meetings. Members are encouraged to be involved on a diocesan level by attending the annual Spring Assembly, hosted each year by a different chapter, and an annual fall retreat held at St. Crispin's each October.

Attendance at our fall retreat held at St. Crispin's Conference Center and our Spring Assembly has continued to increase over the last 3 years. Our Diocese had good representation at the annual Province VII Assembly held in Ft. Worth, Texas as well as at the National Triennial held in Utah. Our upcoming fall retreat will be at St. Crispin's October 22-23.

Last year our diocesan chaplain retired after 9 faithful years of service. We are seeking a new chaplain. Please pray with us that that position will be filled in the near future.

Formation of a chapter requires the consent of the priest or pastor of the church and a minimum of three women who are communicants in good standing in the Episcopal Church, the Anglican Church, the Lutheran Church (ECLA) or the Roman Catholic Church, and who desire to commit themselves to a life of prayer and service. Membership is granted only after a period of study using our National Study Guide, and followed by a period of discernment and prayer. At the end of this time, with the approval of her priest, the candidate may take life-time vows, binding herself to a Rule of Life which encompasses daily prayer, service and evangelism. After she takes her vows, the Daughter wears the cross of

the Order, as an outward sign and constant reminder of the vows she has taken. Because of our vows, our bylaws prohibit us from raising funds. We may only make personal offerings from what we have been blessed to receive.

Any priest or group of women in Oklahoma who is interested in forming a chapter is invited to contact the Diocesan President of Daughters of the King. I will be most happy to discuss your ideas, supply an assortment of brochures about Daughters, and assist your church in forming its own chapter of Daughters of the King.

2016 St. Anselm of Canterbury Annual Report

The Episcopal Church of Oklahoma is committed to the lifelong formation of Christians throughout the Diocese, and the ministry of St. Anselm of Canterbury is an important part of that mission. Campus ministry is uniquely positioned to be a guidepost at one of the most important crossroads of adulthood.

Canterbury has been blessed with a wonderful group of young adults who have grown up knowing the strength of intentional Christian community in the Diocese of Oklahoma through our retreats and camp program. This provides an amazing foundation for reaching out to and providing a landing spot for college students who may not feel comfortable in other traditional college communities such as Fraternities and Sororities or some of the bigger Christian organizations. This has allowed us to really become an incredibly diverse group of faithful people. Episcopal, ELCA, Missouri Synod Lutheran, Presbyterian, Baptist, Unitarian, Deaf, Spectrum Disorder, LGBT, Single Mother, Conservative, Liberal, Undergrad, Graduate Students. All are welcome and have found a safe place to love God within the walls of St. Anselm of Canterbury.

St. Anselm's motto, Faith Seeking Understanding, undergirds everything we do from worship to Christian education. Sunday evenings you will find up to 30 of us worshipping from the Book of Common Prayer and singing out of our Hymnal and chanting the psalms. You will find us in discussion about the lectionary, seeking to understand the Word in a way that informs our modern context. Wednesday evenings is Canterbury Compline at 9:30 and is preceded by Explore, our weekly Christian Education offering where we take a look at the intersection of college life and faith. This past year we tackled subjects like The Role of Alcohol in the Episcopal Church, Addiction, Faith and Sex, Discernment, Pacifism, Materialism, What is Grace, Modernism and Its Role in the Church to name a few. The participation has been wonderful with anywhere from 15-20 students showing up each week.

This past year we also expanded our footprint in the life of the college. We hosted prayer services throughout the year for various student organizations such as Sooners Against Sweatshops as well as numerous days of remembrance and prayer vigils. We also participated in events with other faith organizations like the Catholic Campus Ministry in the Way of the Cross, a campus wide Stations of the Cross and celebrated the Feast day of Absalom Jones with guest preacher Fr. Joseph Alsay. We also baptized and confirmed 3 students, something that hadn't happened in recent memory.

This past year and the coming year is one of change for the building of St. Anselm's as well. We are currently in the planning stages of some extensive renovations to our 100 year old building. It has been a long process due to the historic nature of the building and dated plumbing and electrical work. Ministry to the Campus

- **Wednesday evening Eucharist/dinner.** An informal Eucharist (at 5:30pm) held at the Canterbury Center followed by a meal provided by a St Andrew's parishioner. We have been averaging 18 students so far this semester!
- **Sunday evening fellowship.** We meet at the Canterbury Center 5:30PM to discuss current issues, the role faith plays in our public and private lives, and whatever else comes up. We share a meal provided by a St Andrew's parishioner before closing our evening with compline, evening prayer, or night prayer. Attendance has grown to around 19 or 20.
- **A place to meet and study.** At any given moment, chances are we have students hanging out, studying, eating leftovers, chatting with the chaplain about all sorts of things, catching up on their favorite shows on Netflix, playing ping pong or pool, or even taking a nap. Our location is perfect for those with breaks in their daily schedule.
- **Hosting meetings.** Hospitality is becoming a central focus for our ministry, not just for Episcopalians from across the state and beyond and their friends from other faith backgrounds, but we also are striving to be a welcoming place for the larger campus and Stillwater community. Currently we host the horn studio of one of the instructors at OSU, the monthly meeting of Stillwater's PFLAG chapter, the women of the Saudi Student Association (they desired a place where they could literally let their hair down, and our wall of glass block windows afforded them the privacy to do so), a graduation party for the Bangladeshi student association, and a bible study led by members of Collegiate Outreach Ministries.
- **New Partnership.** This semester we have started a partnership with the Wesley Foundation, the United Methodist ministry on campus. They are in the process of tearing down and rebuilding their facility, so in the meantime they have moved their office next door to us. We are hosting their Sunday morning worship, their monthly women's worship service, and their PB&J Project ministry. On September 11th, Fr. Jeff led worship and preached at their morning service. We believe hospitality is a centerpiece of our ministry and we are thrilled to work with the students and leaders of the Wesley Foundation.
- **Ashes to Go.** On Ash Wednesday this year we posted ourselves outside the student union offering a brief service of prayer, psalm readings, and imposition of ashes. 35+ students and faculty took time to share in the service.
- **Lights on Stillwater.** We have participated the last several years in this annual showcase of local businesses, churches, and campus organizations. It's a great opportunity to introduce ourselves to new students. This year we handed out cozies with the Canterbury Center logo and cozies from St. Andrew's. They were a hit!
- **Finals week brunch.** During finals week the past several semesters the Canterbury Center has offered our "You're almost done with finals brunch!" The turnout has grown and it's been a great opportunity for our regular students to invite friends.
- **Game night.** Enough said.

Canterbury/St Andrew's shared ministry

- Every Sunday evening we put away any of the donations dropped off at St. Andrew's Thrift Shop over the weekend.
- Many students are active in the life of St Andrew's including helping with childcare, singing in the choir, working at the Thrift Shop, and attendance on Sunday mornings.
- More than 20 families from St Andrew's have signed up to provide meals for Canterbury program on Wednesday and Sunday throughout the semester!

- We are grateful for the continued support of the St Andrew's Thrift Shop, whose support annually helps offset operating expenses
- Thank you to the Diocese and this Convention for supporting our ministry financially and enabling this important ministry

- Finally, thank you to all of the parishes and missions in the Diocese of Oklahoma for raising up such wonderful students. **Report to the Episcopal Diocese of Oklahoma
Saint Simeon's, Tulsa, Oklahoma
September 2016**



Saint Simeon's Episcopal Home in Tulsa continues its tradition of excellent care for over 56 years. We are the preferred home for men and women of all faiths who wish to live their later years in an environment with dignity, individuality and the highest attainable level of independence. Saint Simeon's offers eight levels of care: Independent Living, four levels of Assisted Living, Memory Care, Health Care, and Skilled Nursing. Saint Simeon's is home to 180 Residents and employs 200 people.

Saint Simeon's is grateful for the guidance and support of Bishop Ed Konieczny and the Episcopal Diocese of Oklahoma.

A great new addition to the campus this year has been a beautiful Physical Therapy room, where Residents undergoing Skilled Nursing stays can improve and recover under the skillful instruction of Saint Simeon's contracted physical, speech, and occupational therapists (below). The room was provided for through "Lots of Love" gifts at Western Days 2015.



This year, Saint Simeon's has had an internal focus on building up an even more qualified, long-lasting nursing staff. Employee retention has become increasingly important as Saint Simeon's strives to provide the best care in Tulsa. We make great efforts to ensure that we gain and keep the best nursing staff possible. Some strategies that have been implemented in regards to employee retention include Kris's Caring Champion, a monthly program that rewards employees who have gone above and beyond the call of duty, an employee newsletter, an annual employee carnival, and quarterly meetings with two different groups of employees to discuss ideas on how to connect better with each other.

Saint Simeon's continues to enjoy partnerships with local Episcopal churches. Saint Simeon's staff members are always available to make presentations on topics related to aging at local parishes, and we often host churches for Lunch and Learn presentation at Saint Simeon's.

This year, the Saint Simeon's Foundation hosted its 20th Annual Western Days. Western Days 2016: *Decades of Compassion* raised over \$500,000 and was attended by more than 700 guests. The September 13, 2016 evening featured live and silent auctions, as well as live musical entertainment.

Another exciting fundraiser held by the Saint Simeon's Foundation this year was "A Grand Evening" on March 20. Friends of Saint Simeon's enjoyed a splendid evening at The Polo Grill during which patrons donated *a grand* to go towards new beds in the Memory Center. In total, the event raised \$35,100.

It has been an eventful, successful year for Saint Simeon's. It is, however, the heart of our mission to provide daily care to frail and elderly individuals. Our success is measured in large part by the responses we receive from Residents and family members. Letters such as the following, written to our President & CEO, Lindsay Hurley Fick, are the most telling feedback we receive as a senior care community:



Dear Ms. Fick,

Our introduction to Saint Simeon's was originally to be for Ron to live here only for a few weeks while I recuperated from surgery. However, the reception and care given to Ron with his Parkinson's disease has been so phenomenal that we decided to move him into Assisted Living long-term. In addition to the great care offered here, the individual instruction given in the Wellness Center and pool go beyond expectations. The pool is one of Ron's

favorite places.

Moving Ron in to Saint Simeon's was the best decision for our family. Here, he has an even better quality of life than he was experiencing at home.

THE ARDMORE VILLAGE

February 1, 1984 the first residents of Ardmore Village moved into the Cottages, HUD subsidized housing. One of those original “move ins” still calls Ardmore Village home! Ardmore Village consists of 112 cottages and apartments that house residents who are 62 years of age and older and meet the HUD financial requirements. All lawn care and maintenance is provided. Activities are centered around having fun while staying active and healthy. Transportation is also provided within the city limits of Ardmore.

Ardmore Village owns 17 Townhomes that are rented to people 55 years and older for modest rent which includes maintenance and lawn care. Townhome residents can participate in the Village activities by joining our Club Active for a \$15 yearly fee. Any Senior Adult in the Ardmore area can join Club Active and participate in our activities.

The Lodge at Ardmore Village is a 54-suite assisted living residence. The Lodge is 14 years old and is undergoing a makeover! All the original carpet has been replaced this past year. Plans are in place to replace the dining room furniture and the flooring in the dining room and front entry. Adding on to the Lodge so that all Village residents can age in place by having a Medicaid and Memory Care option is a desire of the Board.

This year thanks to storm damage and our insurance company, every roof at the Village, except for our management building (Sutton Center – metal roof) was repaired and shingled at very little out of pocket cost! We no longer have “leaky roofs!”

Our cottages and Townhomes have a history of being full with waiting lists which continues to be the case. The Lodge experienced a dip in occupancy but is full once again. One of the biggest changes and improvements at the Lodge this year has been in the food quality and service. We have a great staff who have worked hard to improve food quality and to add things such as our salad bar which has been a big hit with the residents!

Most important is that Ardmore Village is full of residents who are happy (for the most part!) and who are served by loving staff.

Holland Hall

Dear Diocesan Convention,

Holland Hall began our 95th year of continuous operation and our 58th as an Episcopal school serving students in and around the Tulsa area, as well as students from around the world, this August. With both strategic and marketing plans in place, buoyed by an auspicious beginning to our \$50 million capital campaign we are delighted to continue to share the Episcopal tradition of an open, inclusive community that values the dignity and worth of every human being in our midst with our students, their families, and the broader Tulsa community.

Much is shared in the education and parenting worlds about the importance of instilling the virtues of tenacity and resiliency in our children. Holland Hall could not agree more. These virtues are deeply ingrained in our work with students and families beginning at the earliest ages. To achieve the aspirations outlined in our mission – critical thinking, lifelong learning, forming a strong moral foundation, and developing a deep sense of social responsibility in a college prep curriculum – a child must have a cadre of adults and positive peers present to offer support and encouragement. But what's often missing from the conversation is the importance of a spiritual relationship – one that looks both inward and outward. Not just Holland Hall, but all Episcopal schools are ably crafted to offer the presence of a spiritual community that fosters transcendent connections in the presence of our relationships as well as through spiritual insight.

So how does Holland Hall fulfill that promise, that remarkable opportunity all children should have, in our work with students?

Create time and space for spiritual worship and reflection: All students receive religious education that is non-doctrinal and focused on our common humanity among religions while delving into biblical history. Beginning in kindergarten, students also attend weekly chapel services led by our chaplains: Father Art Scrutchins (upper school) and Reverend Amy Venable (primary and middle school). We also offer an optional Eucharist service Thursday morning before the day begins. -Chapel is a time for quiet worship, for being together in community, and for sharing common stories about how to live a good and meaningful life. It's also a great place to bless animals during the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. Finally, All Saints Chapel serves as an anchor when our community experiences its greatest times of need, including, in some instances, for families who need a peaceful, comforting place for celebrating the life of a loved one who has passed.

Create opportunities to connect with one another through nature: With a 162 acre campus in south Tulsa that serves as both laboratory and playground, students as young as three years of age foster their natural curiosity among our forest, trails, and pond. In middle school, our students begin to spend the night on campus and, eventually, leave campus for truly outstanding, transformative experiences at St. Crispin’s Conference Center. (All 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students attend these trips, called *School Out of Doors*.) Finally, in 9th grade they pack up all their food and tents, grab their compasses (okay, GPS devices), and head to the Wichita National Wildlife Refuge just west of Lawton for two nights in the pure wilderness. Freshman Orientation, now in its 47th year, is the culminating experience that deepens relationships and an “inward look” amidst the backdrop of God’s creation.

Create learning environments that foster servant leadership: The test of true, deep learning is in the impact felt years after the experience. Every child strives to better understand themselves through the gifts and talents they hope to develop. Developing those talents best happens while in service to others. Many of our students travel to Ecuador on service learning experiences, to Tanzania to assist at JBFC (Janada L. Batchelor Foundation for Children), a boarding school for orphaned girls, or to local schools and hospitals where they tutor and translate. Holland Hall has also fostered ongoing connections for peer experiences in service and community together with both public and private schools in east and north Tulsa. Many other examples and opportunities abound.

Of course we are fortunate to have faculty from all over the country that value these ideals and the life of the mind. Our faculty give of themselves in and out of the classroom so students can grasp opportunities to study and live at colleges and universities where they can continue to grow into meaningful lives. Returning to our mission, Holland Hall is a college prep school that is able to offer more than just outstanding academics, arts, and athletics. Because of our distinct Episcopal approach and the care we offer for every child, we can offer them growth into lives that matter, lives that are propelled through college.

Annual Report to the Seventy-ninth Diocesan Convention September 2016

Since our founding in 1947 by the Rt. Reverend Thomas Casady, Casady School has enjoyed the many benefits and blessings of being an Episcopal Day School. We continue to value and appreciate the support of the Rt. Reverend Dr. Edward J. Konieczny and the Oklahoma Diocese. In part because of this strong bond between the Oklahoma Diocese and the School, we at Casady confidently live our mission into the lives of hundreds of students every year. Our mission calls for us to develop excellence, confidence, and integrity in students and to prepare them with the skills and knowledge that serve as the foundation for success. Without the support of the Diocese, both in prayer and in dollars, the School would not be able to improve the lives of so many students. We are grateful for the many who continue to lift our Institution up in prayer and who continue to value financially the mission of the School.

While we expected to see a decline in enrollment for the 2015/2016 school year due to the economic woes, we actually saw an increase of 24 students, a 2.4% increase. We opened the year with 900 students, compared to the previous year's enrollment of 876. This past year's enrollment of 900 for our grades Pre-Kindergarten to grade Twelve was made up of a healthy mix of 448 boys and 452 girls. Of the 900 students, 26% were a minority representation, and we are pleased to have been able to fund financial aid to approximately 25% of the student body.

We continued to work on the School's Strategic Plan with a focus on; 1 – Excellence in Teaching and Learning, 2 – Excellence in Balance, 3 – Excellence in Community, and 4 – Excellence through Sustainability. This past year, we spent a lot of time and energy building Community by completely rebuilding a new website that is more intuitive to navigate, as well as creating intentional and more meaningful communications to our various communities to keep them informed of the good work we are doing. Additionally, the Board worked to ensure that its governance followed “best practice” in its operations. To that end, we adjusted the bylaws to reflect continuity of Institutional memory, as advised by an Independent School governance expert, and we also implemented a board self-evaluation tool to continue to ensure that the good of the School stands always at the center of the board's focus.

We are very proud of our class of 15/16 seniors. All 77 will be attending college or experiencing a rich gap year experience before joining their university classmates. This class averaged a 28 on the ACT, which puts our school in the top 90th percentile of schools across the country. However, that is not the most impressive part of the numbers. What Casady School does so well is develop all our children top to bottom in everything we do, and this class graduates with depth in its academic achievements. The top quartile of the class of 2016 earned a 32 on the ACT, the second quartile a 28, the third quartile a 26, and the fourth quartile a 25! As you can see, our students had plenty of options as they looked to choose the college or university that was, for them, the best fit.

This year's class was accepted to 46 highly selective colleges and universities. Schools like Brown, Johns Hopkins, Wash U, Georgetown Foreign Service, Vanderbilt, Duke, Pomona, Bowdoin, USC Film School, and UMKC BS/MD. More importantly, our students had options and picked the best-fit school for them.

We had 3 National Merit Finalists, 2 National Hispanic Scholars, a UNC Morehead-Cain Semifinalist, and our first ever Gates Millennium Scholar (valued at nearly \$500,000). Approximately 75% of this class will attend 36 schools in 20 different states, and 25% will matriculate to 5 schools in state. Collectively, this group will receive more than \$5 million in merit scholarships.

While the class of 2016 impresses academically, they impress in other ways, too. This class had more than 10,000 hours of service, with one student receiving the Noble Award for her more than 1,000 hours of service. This class also was heavily involved in the arts, and our orchestra received the highest awards at state contest by playing a 6A level piece, despite being "just" a 2A level school! Finally, we have five students opting to play athletics at the next level, in Field Hockey, Softball, and Football.

As you can see, Casady School and the Oklahoma Episcopal Diocese has again developed a graduating class of confident, well-balanced young men and women who understand that they belong to something greater than themselves. We are grateful to the Diocese and the Bishop for their continued support of the School's mission.

Another class of seniors always follows close behind the last; therefore, we continue to grow our reserve for deferred maintenance so that our students tomorrow will be afforded the same quality of educational space as our students experience today, and we continue to increase the amount of money we allocate for faculty development to ensure that not only the physical plant but also the caliber of teaching remains current and relevant in living out our mission and vision.

In addition, we continue to work on our master campus plan. We want to maintain our facilities so that all children who go through the buildings have a similar experience--one of a safe and nurturing environment and not one in need of repair. We continue to work a plan that, over the next five years, projects us to be in position to remodel a significant number of the buildings that call for renovations.

This year, we were able to repair, replace, and paint our outer perimeter wrought iron fence. We completed our lake sidewalk so that now all divisions have access to our daily chapel

program on a lit, eight foot sidewalk. We also were able to put in a new entrance off of Penn, which had fallen into disrepair. On the building renovation side, we put HVAC into our north gym so that now all our gym facilities have HVAC, and we repaired and re-surfaced the track. Our Upper Division has new furniture in the student center, and let me say we certainly got our money's worth out of the old furniture! We also completed the Miller Hall (language building) interior renovation. All this was done through the discipline of the board to budget for deferred maintenance, and no fundraising money was expended to accomplish this. Our goal is to focus our fundraising efforts on new construction and endowment for the support of our amazing faculty.

We are excited to share with you the biographies (attached) of the nine new faculty members, three administrative positions, and two head coaches for the 2016/17 school year. In summary, we have added four new faculty positions and one new administrative position to the school. Of the nine new faculty members, six hold a master's degree and three hold a bachelor's degree, and our new teachers come from as far away as China, from New Jersey, and from right here in our backyard of Oklahoma.

2016 Annual Report to Diocesan Convention

Oak Hall Episcopal School (OHES) continues to live into its mission of being “dedicated to the intellectual, creative, physical, social, emotional, and spiritual growth of each student to his or her potential within a Christian environment in the Episcopal tradition”.

The School is accredited by the Oklahoma State Department of Education and the Southwest Association of Episcopal Schools. This past year, the School undertook our 10 year re-accreditation process with SAES. This involved the preparation by the Board and Faculty & Staff of a detailed self-study, as well as a three-day on-site visit by a team of five SAES members. OHES holds memberships of the Oklahoma Commission of Episcopal Schools, the National Association of Episcopal Schools, and the National Association of Independent Schools. In 2015-2016 we were once again named a Great Expectations “Model” School. Ten years ago OHES was the first private school in the nation to achieve this status.

Another highlight was one of our Fourth Graders placing second in the Oklahoma State National Geographic Bee. Along with the winner and third place finisher, their accomplishments were recognized in OKC on the floor of the State House and Senate.

Our 32,000 square foot purpose-built facility, occupied since 1996, with an addition built in 2000, continues to be used by children, three years old through the Eighth Grade. Oak Hall Episcopal School offers the traditional list of subjects, but as our goal is to educate the ‘whole child’, we include recess, music, and physical education every day, and Spanish beginning in Second Grade. In addition, science is taught from First Grade by a specialist teacher.

Last year’s enrollment was impacted by the decline in the local economy. We ended the year with 133 students (nine percent identified as Episcopalian). With the help of the Diocese and two foundations, we were once again able to offer a substantial amount of needs-based financial aid, with 21% of our students receiving assistance. Of course, the reality is that every student receives a form of financial assistance. Tuition does not cover the cost of educating a child, and we are fortunate to have the support of our families and the local community in helping raise funds to bridge this gap.

Importantly, the School continued to offer hospitality through the use of our facility to community groups such as the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Girls on the Run, the Ardmore Corporate Fitness Challenge, and the Samuel Roberts Noble Foundation.

Finally, it is important that the support of Bishop Ed and the Episcopal Diocese of Oklahoma, and Father Steve and St. Philip's Episcopal Church be recognized. OHES is a very small school, and the assistance of these individuals and institutions has had far-reaching effects on our ability to be who we are. We believe that Oak Hall Episcopal School is demonstrating the very best of Episcopal education, to be comprehensive and inclusive – where children of all faiths, or none, are welcomed and celebrated as children of God, and where they are given the tools, opportunities, and encouragement to develop lives of meaning, purpose, and service to the community and world in which they live. School Report:

Our teachers guide the students to learn through research, discovery, and exploration. These are all taught by each individual teacher in the classrooms as well as in the class of sacred studies.

Our Child Development Program, which began in 2005, serves children ages 6 weeks through 3 years of age. We are licensed by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services. The staff is experienced in early childhood philosophies and approaches to education.

St. John's is accredited by and an active member of the Southwestern Association of Episcopal Schools, a member of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, and has a membership in the Oklahoma Commission of Episcopal Schools.

The administration, faculty, vestry and Board of Trustees have been working diligently on keeping pace with the strategic plan. The teams are building the vision of St. John's to provide the school an opportunity to assemble a multi-representative group of people who provide a wide-range of viewpoint, memories, and great hopes for the future of St. John's. These leaders are inclusive of the school community, have the ability to address a wide variety of issues, and, with their collective thinking, are committed to compel the school to articulate a visionary plan.

St. John's Episcopal School has taken steps to ensure that the pedagogy practiced in the school addresses the multiple modalities of student learning and facilitates students identifying and understanding their most productive learning process.
